EVENT SUMMARY

By 2050, 70% of the world's population will be living in urban areas and the number of slum dwellers will increase to 3 billion. Such rapid pace of urbanisation threatens to put unprecedented pressure on urban infrastructure, making it prone to disease outbreaks and limit service provision capacities.

SDG 11 intends to make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient, and sustainable by 2030, leaving no one behind. Urban areas are home to diverse communities and groups including indigenous people, refugees, and migrants, which add immense value and vibrance to cities. This day-long event, **Inclusive Cities: Last Mile Delivery in Slums and Informal Settlements**, co-curated by UN-Habitat, brings together eminent experts from across the world to draw attention to inclusive solutions for building safe, resilient, and sustainable settlements.

Panelists will share insights and learnings from models of slum upgradation and frameworks for improved access to essential services including health, education, water, and sanitation that have proven to make positive social and economic changes in their respective communities.

The roundtable will include participation from **Balakrishnan Rajagopal**, UN Special Rapporteur for the Right to Adequate Housing (VIRTUAL), **Ms. Freda Prempeh** (MP), Minister of State, Ministry of Works and Housing, Government of the Republic of Ghana (VIRTUAL), **Washington Fajardo**, Urban Planning Secretary, Municipality of Rio de Janeiro and **Somsook Boonyabancha**, Secretary General, Asian Coalition for Housing Rights to share recommendations, best practices and inputs based on their work on ground. The session will be followed by a Q&A from the audience.

Moderated by **Ana Claudia Rossbach**, Regional Manager LAC, City Alliance, and **Patrick Canagasingham**, Chief Operating Office, Habitat for Humanity, these case studies will showcase stories of resilience and the benefits of a participatory approach, required in developing sustainable solutions for challenges such as systemic poverty and inequality in cities and highlight the value of giving greater focus to housing, basic services, sustainable mobility, and connectivity in informal settlements.

Speakers will share key takeaways on their approach to designing solutions and their learnings on what needs to be prioritised in informal, urban settlements.

Case Study 1: Dr Sasha Kramer will share the story of leading Sustainable Organic Integrated Livelihoods (SOIL), a successful innovation model which has brought about a sanitation revolution in Haiti

Case Study 2: Vincentia Koranteng-Asante, Community Leader, Ga Mashie Community, Accra (Ghana), will shed light on UN-Habitat's Participatory Slum Upgrading Program, which addresses the living conditions of slum dwellers by directly engaging with communities on areas such as livelihood, housing, water, and sanitation.

Case Study 3 Emily Roell will highlight the story of upgrading city spaces and preserving heritage through Doh Eain, a Myanmar based nonprofit which focusses on participatory design practice dedicated to making cities better.

Case Study 4: Lucy Livesley, will share insights on building and investing in innovative housing models at Reall.
